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Sexually Transmitted Infections - Bacterial

transmitted by sexual contact, anal, oral, genital, and skin-to-skin contact.

Some bacterial STIs can cause permanent damage to a woman's reproductive system. This can make it difficult to get pregnant later on.

Each of these infections can increase the risk of getting HIV. It is very important to get tested and treated if you have any symptoms.

Sexually Transmitted Infections - Viral

are transmitted by sexual contact, oral sex, and skin-to-skin contact.

Herpes Simplex Virus (HSV) is a common viral STI. It is often passed through oral sex. There are two types: HSV-1 and HSV-2. HSV-1 is usually associated with cold sores, while HSV-2 is associated with genital herpes. Both can be passed through skin-to-skin contact.

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) is a very common viral STI. It is often passed through sexual intercourse. There are many different types of HPV, some of which can cause genital warts and cervical cancer. HPV is often passed through skin-to-skin contact.

Hepatitis B is a viral STI that can be passed through sexual intercourse, sharing needles, and from mother to child during childbirth. It can cause liver disease and is often passed through blood-to-blood contact.

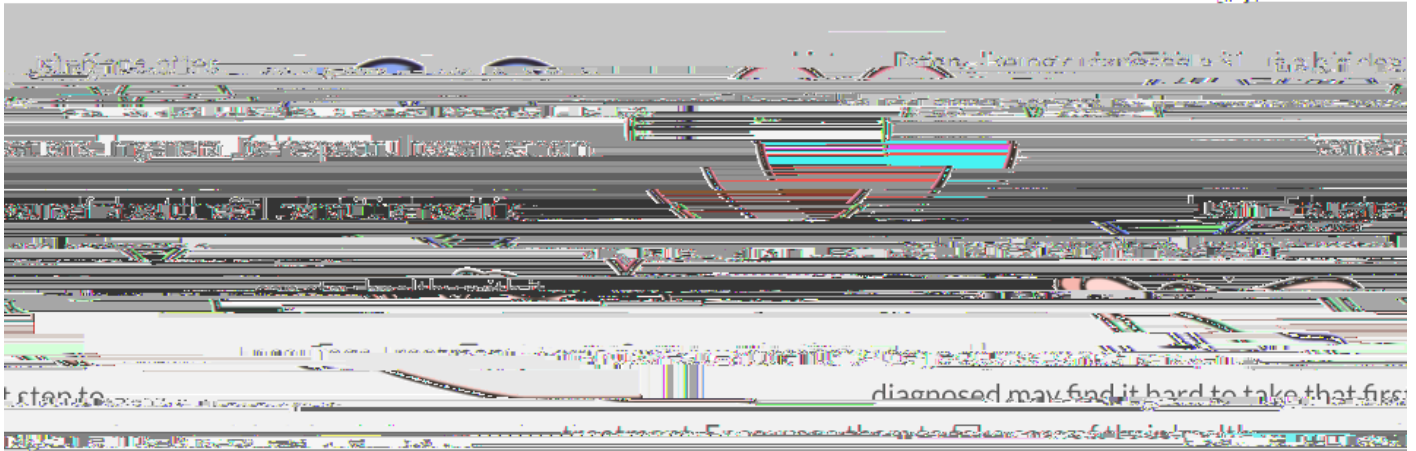
